


Answer questions 1-2 before watching the India segment.


- 5. Gooday wanted to be sterilized after having a difficult birth with her last child. Who stopped her?


- 8. One out of ten children in Uttar Pradesh dies before age five. How would this influence fertility rates?

- 13. Conducting an ultrasound with the intent to identify gender is now illegal in India. Why?



What does the shape of this pyramid tell you about India's demographics?









Question for Further Thought

45. The United Nations supports a program in sub-Saharan Africa that provides free birth control and family planning education to help alleviate many of these issues. However, some of the money has been found to also fund abortion clinics in many African countries. Some of this money has also "disappeared" due to the high amount of corruption in many of the governments of the different African countries.

This has placed the United States, one of the biggest sources of United Nations funding, in a dilemma. Do we support this program, which helps reduce population growth, poverty, and AIDS transmission, or withhold funding due to the moral consequences?

George W. Bush, a Republican who was president from 2000-2008, opted to withdraw funding from this effort. Barack Obama, a Democrat who was elected in 2008, has restored much of this funding. If you were president, what would you do? Explain why you would make this decision from both a practical and a moral standpoint.


Independent Research
